
## Curriculum Information

All pupils follow a course of study, which is designed to enhance the requirements of the National Curriculum.

They enter school following the <u>Early Years Foundation Stage Curriculum</u> in Early Years. This focuses on children learning through play and is based on seven areas of learning, including Communication and Language, Physical Development, Personal, Social and Emotional Development, Literacy, Mathematics, Understanding the world, Expressive arts and design.

Learning will take place both inside and outside the classroom.

In Year I, pupils move on to the <u>National Curriculum</u>, which all primary school children must study. The National Curriculum comprises of English, Mathematics, Science, History, Geography, Design & Technology, Music, Art & Design, Physical Education, Languages (from Year 3) and Computing. Religious Education (NYCC locally agreed syllabus), Personal, Social, Health & Citizenship Education and Mental Health are also taught in school. Children also fo'llow a Relationships education programme.

## Assembly and Religious Education

Children attend a variety of assemblies every week which focus on how to uphold the values and expectations we have in school and how to ensure they contribute to life positively in modern Britain. Assemblies occasionally have religious content related to our values and expectations in school. These are sometimes led by visiting speakers.

The school is not affiliated to any particular religious denomination.

The teachers currently make use of the agreed syllabus of R.E. for North Yorkshire County Council.

Learning about the different religions around us is an important part of learning about the world around us to enable us all to understand the similarities and differences we all have and to uphold the fundamental British Values of tolerance and mutual respect. We aim to educate children about Religion to enable the to treat each other equally and fairly in British society.

Parents/carers have the right to withdraw their child from religious education should they wish to, however we do stress that a discussion with the Headteacher or Deputy Headteacher takes place before this decision is taken.

## Assessment Information

Similar to other schools throughout the country, our children are assessed on their performance in the National Curriculum

Year I - Phonics screening check (June)

Year 4 - Multiplication Tables Check (June)


Year 6 - Maths, Reading, GPS statutory tests. (KS2 SATS)

All children in years complete end of term reading and maths assessments to inform teaching and learning in the classroom.

When children enter our school in EYFS, our staff complete a baseline assessment of them against a set national criteria within the first 6 weeks of entering the classroom.

Attainment and progress is monitored each term by class teachers and leaders in school.

Whilst the National Curriculum identifies statutory programmes of study, it accepts that all children have individual needs, abilities and skills and it is the school's responsibility to try to meet those needs and educate each child to the limit of their potential. Individual pupil progress and attainment is tracked using our Management Information System.





Northstead is an Inclusive school for all pupils Our SEND Pathway



Children who require anything additional and different will be identified by the class teacher and will have initial conversations with you. Any queries or concerns around Special Education Needs that you have, must be discussed with your class teacher. A short note (an initial recorded note of an identified need) will be documented by the class teacher to the SENCo

Your child will be initially be put on a Monitoring Plan. This will then be reviewed termly. If your child requires further support, we may place your child on SEND Support.

SEND Support is a more formal process using the Graduated Approach of Assess, Plan, Do and Review. You and your child will be involved in this process gathering your views

An SEND Review Meeting is held between yourselves and the class teacher, 3 times a year. Support and provision will be provided by the class teacher.

If your child requires significant and specialist support a referral for an EHCP can be made.

If your child has an EHCP, we will strive to meet the outcomes set out in sections E and F, with the delegated budget and resources available to the school. An EHCP does not guarantee an additional adult within the classroom.

If required, referrals to external agencies can be completed to further support your child in school. As with all services in North Yorkshire, there are long waiting lists and high criteria to access these services. These will be completed collaboratively, working with yourselves, class teachers, our Inclusion and Referral Manager and the SENCo where appropriate.

## Provision for Pupils with Disabilities

We are an inclusive school and we liaise closely with the Local Education Authority to provide a safe and inclusive environment for all the children, including those children with disabilities. We work hard to ensure that all our pupils have access to the whole curriculum and physical access to school buildings.

Northstead Community Primary School works in partnership with the Local Authority and abides by their Admission Policy. Pupils with disabilities are included in the school on the full advice and information given by parents and involved outside agencies. In school a child with any special needs is monitored and supported by Special Needs Staff as outlined in our SEND Policy.

The school's Equality Policy and Accessibility Plan sets out the Governors' response to the Special Educational Needs and Disability Act 2001, which required that a pupil should not be treated less favourably because of a disability. The current plan is available from the school on request. The intention and implications of this plan are to ensure inclusion and equality of opportunity for all pupils.

Inclusive toilets and staff facilities are provided in school. All ground floor classrooms and learning areas are accessible by pupils with disabilities. The school hall has a hearing loop installed. Further details can be found in the school's Disability Policy, which is available on request.

The Headteacher, Senior Leadership Team and staff implement the SEND Policy which is reflective of the SEND Code of Practice and the Equality Act 2010. ## Safeguarding

Northstead Community Primary School is committed to safeguarding and promoting the safety and wellbeing of all children. In order for children to learn, it is essential that all children feel safe and happy. Staff regularly discuss safeguarding matters, to maintain an ethos of safety for our pupils where action is taken swiftly when concerns have been identified. Staff understand their duty of care, operate within a culture of 'it can happen here', and always act if they have concerns about the safety and wellbeing of any child.

The school has a dedicated Safeguarding & Welfare Team, easily identified by their orange lanyards. The team consists of two Designated Safeguarding Leads: Vanessa Valancius, Assistant Headteacher and Lisa Roberts, Safeguarding and Pastoral Manager who are supported by our Children and Family Mentor: Michelle James. The team work closely with staff in school, our link safeguarding governor, Children & Families Service Early Help, Children's Social Care, North Yorkshire Police and other external agencies to ensure that children & their families are safeguarded and get the right support at the right time. Regular training is provided for all staff and governors.

Wherever possible we will speak to parents about safeguarding issues concerning their child and to other agencies as necessary (See Child Protection policy).


Frequent two-way communication is vital to ensure you know what is happening at school and so teachers know any important events or information from home. (Turn on dojo notifications please)

## Class Dojo

Class Dojo is our platform for communicating with families. It allows us to let you know what's happening inside our classrooms and in school. Teachers can share updates and announcements, and show examples of work carried out in the classroom. Consent for information to be shared will be sought when your child starts at school. Parents will be given a secure login to access their child's class information. We currently do not use the messaging facility on class dojo.

## Software

Some software used in school, requires pupil information to be shared to enable it to work (only necessary information). For a list of providers this applies to, please see the school website. This list will be updated where possible, throughout the school year.









## Curriculum Enhancement Activities

The school does a great deal more than just deliver the National Curriculum. A wide range of curriculum enhancement activities is always offered for both Key stage I and Key stage 2 children. Activities take place during the lunch hour and after school.

## <u>Sport</u>

The range of activities will vary from time to time, but usually football, rugby and cricket are available. Rounders, cross-country, tennis, netball, gymnastics and athletics are also available at different points during the year.

## Children's University

In years 5 and 6 we encourage all children to participate in Children's University. A scheme designed to enhance children's participation in curriculum enhancement.

Clubs vary by year group and we encourage all children to engage in curriculum enhancement clubs when given the chance.

Please note: No child may remain at school after 3.10pm without first obtaining parental permission.

## Visits and Excursions

The school has always placed great importance on providing high quality learning visits to local attractions, essentially to enhance the children's learning. Throughout their time in school, children visit the many places available to us in the local community as well as some learning visits to places further away.

In year 6, a residential overnight visit takes place (5 days/4 nights). This provides a wealth of wonderful learning opportunities at Peat Rigg residential activity centre (located in Cropton Forest). Walking, canoeing, shelter building, and rock climbing are all introduced at a level suitable for pupils.

All children in years 3 to 6 also have the opportunity to attend a I-day outdoor adventurous day at North Yorkshire Water Park in the Summer Term. This is paid for through the school's sports premium grant.

## Important Note

These trips would only take place with the time given by our amazing staff to ensure children are safe, secure and happy the whole time they are away from home.

Visits and Visitors to school are nearly always partly-funded by Friends of Northstead.

## CORE Superstar award - 500 dojos

Children will receive a certificate and be taken on a special trip at the end of the year to celebrate their amazing achievement. Children will also get their name on the Platinum awards winner board which will be displayed in school.

Every week in our 'star of the week' assembly, the headteacher and teachers recognise individuals who consistently demonstrate our CORE values. These children are presented with 'Star of the Week' Certificates and 'Headteacher Awards'

## Stars of Northstead

Each Term, two children from each class will be chosen to receive the prestigious 'Stars of Northstead award' for always demonstrating our CORE Values in school. Parents of these children will be invited to a special assembly to watch their child receive their award. Children receiving this award must always be children who are role models for others and have not received any consequences.

## The School Day

Children should arrive at school between 8:30am and 8:38am to ensure they are in their classroom before 8:40am.

Key Stage one and Key Stage two gates open from 8:30am and close promptly at 8:38am.

Gates close at 8:39am as children must be in their classroom by 8:40am (e.g. not entering the playground at 8:40am).

Lateness means lost learning! Be on time, every time, to help your child be as successful as they can be at Northstead Primary School.

Lunchtimes are:

11.30 - 12.30pm EYFS lunch 12.00 - 1.00 pm KSI & KS2 lunch

Lessons end at 3.10pm and children are brought out onto the playground.

(Gates open between 3:00 and 3:05pm)





## School Uniform

## Introduction

It is our school expectation that all children wear school uniform when attending school, or when participating in a school organised event outside normal school hours. A complete list of the items needed is included further on in this prospectus.

Aims and Objectives

The governors and staff expect all pupils attending Northstead Community Primary School will wear the official school uniform and adhere to the school dress code. This is based on the notion that school uniform:

- Promotes a sense of pride in the school
- Develops a sense of community and belonging towards the school
- Is practical and smart
- Identifies the children with the school
- Prevents children from coming to school in fashion clothes that could be distracting in class
- Eliminates competition amongst children in relation to what they wear and how they look.
- Makes children feel equal to their peers in terms of appearance
- Is regarded as suitable wear for school and good value for money by most pupils and parents
- Is designed with health and safety in mind
- Creates a unified group of children who are focused on learning.



## <u>Jewellery</u>

For reasons of health and safety we ask parents/carers to ensure their children do not wear jewellery whilst in school.

The exception to this rule is that children with pierced ears may wear ear studs, one per ear and these MUST be removed for any physical activity in school or whilst on a school excursion.

If getting your child's ear or ears pierced please do so at the start of the summer holidays.

It is permissible to cover earrings with tape but this must be done at home and only as a last resort.

If children are unable to take ear studs out themselves they should be left at home.

School staff are not allowed to remove or replace earrings.

Highly coloured nails and nail extensions are not acceptable.

## Body Art

It is not permissible for children to come to school with tattoos, (permanent or transfers). These are distracting and may cause skin irritations. They should, with parental permission, only be used in the holidays and at other leisure times.

## Hair

It is expected that parents/carers support the school by ensuring children do not arrive into school with sculpted hair, e.g. patterns in hair / false extensions, vibrant colours. It is difficult to enter into degrees of what is acceptable; it is easier to say not to all.



The role of Parents/Carers - Uniform

We ask all parents who send their children to Northstead to support the uniform policy and expectations we have. Parents/carers have a duty to send their children to school correctly dressed and ready for their daily school work. One of the responsibilities of parents and carers is to ensure that their child has the correct, appropriate uniform, and that it is in good repair. If there is ever a serious reason why a parent needs their child to temporarily wear clothes that differ from the school uniform they should put this in writing, in the first instance to the class teacher.

## Northstead School Uniform

Black shoes / trainers\*. Grey or black trousers, shorts, skirt Grey jumper or cardigan. White stiff collared shirt or blouse. Northstead Tie. If tights are worn they should also be grey or black.

- •PLEASE PLEASE PLEASE Would you ensure that all uniform is clearly labelled with your child's name. With 630 grey jumpers in one place it is often difficult to tell them apart!
- •If black trainers are worn they should be as close to 100% black as possible.

•Uniform items can be purchased from most high street retailers.
•School ties can be purchased from the School Office.
We look forward to your continued co-operation in helping to make our children smart, well presented members of the school and wider community.

During the summer term children are allowed to wear a blue and white or a purple and white dress as an alternative to the normal school uniform, if desired.

\*Trainers should be completely black, as should shoes.













## PE Kit

All pupils should have the expected Northstead PE Kit. Children are requested not to wear football kit for PE lessons. From Year I to Year 6, children will have PE lessons both indoors and outdoors.


In the Early Years (Reception), the children only need a white t-shirt (round-necked is preferable) and a pair of navy blue shorts. We do not start PE straight away and will let you know when to send it into school. Please send in the following, named and in a suitable bag:



## Northstead PE Uniform

White polo shirt or t-shirt Navy blue or black shorts Navy blue round neck sweatshirt (not hooded) Navy blue or black joggers Trainers (Any colour) Socks

No football tops or shorts please.



At our school, we ask children to come to school with their PE uniform already on when it is their PE day. Children do not need to bring any uniform in a bag. It is recommended that children wear jogging bottoms, white t-shirt and blue jumper on these days. (+ Trainers)







## Absence and Illness

Please help us.....

It is really important that children arrive on time for school and that all absence is accounted for - to ensure that no child is truanting and unauthorised absences are reduced.

Please limit our administrative time for absence by telephoning the school before 8:30am on the first morning of absence indicating the length and the reason for your child's absence.

Absence reporting <u>must not</u> be done via email.

It is school policy that any child with a sickness bug should remain off school for 48 hours. We expect support from all parents/carers with this matter to ensure we limit the spread of sickness bugs in the school community.

Research shows that there is a clear link between attendance and progress. Consequently, we ask all parents to support us by ensuring a first-rate attendance in school. In line with the Department for Education requirements, the school will not 'authorise' any leave of absence during term time except in 'exceptional circumstances' and only then with the approval of the Headteacher. In such circumstances, the previous year's attendance will also be a major contributory factor to any decision made.

Leave of absence that is not agreed, will be deemed as 'unauthorised' and may result in a fine being levied by NYCC.



## Leave of absence for a child in term time

In 2024-2025, Northstead children lost 579 days of learning due to term-time holidays being taken.

While we appreciate the importance of holidays for families and the special time that this can bring for many, the following will be applied to all term-time holiday requests with the Headteacher's decision being final.

- ·Holidays will not be authorised if a leave of absence form is not handed to the office before going on holiday
- ·Holidays may not be authorised for any child with attendance below 90% in the previous academic year
- ·Holidays may not be authorised for any child who has attendance below 90% in the current academic year

Attendance under 90% is classed as being persistently absent from school.

Holidays will only be authorised in exceptional circumstances and this is solely at the discretion of the Headteacher.

No evidence with the form = unauthorised.

The Headteacher's decision is final on all leave of absence requests.



## <u>Medical Matters</u> Administering Medication in School

In line with the recommendations, Northstead School follows the policy and procedure set out by North Yorkshire County Council, therefore:

School will not administer any non prescribed medication unless such medication is stated on a Health Care Plan.

This will include over the counter medicines such as Calpol and other painkillers and anti inflammatory tablets and medicine, throat lozenges, cough sweets, eye drops, hay fever and travel sickness tablets, creams, lotions and other such products.

- If medicines have been prescribed it is considered that it is preferable that medication should be taken at home.
- Parents should assist by asking the prescribing medical practitioner if the administration can, whenever possible, occur outside school times.
- In certain diagnosed medical conditions medication may need, with agreement from the school, to be administered in school but only in cases where not to do so would be detrimental to a child/young person's health.
- School will only consider a request for the administration of prescribed medication on completion of a Form Med I (available from school office).
- Should a Med I Form be agreed then the school will abide by the procedures outlined in the 'Administration of Medication' Form Med 2 (available from the school office).
- Parents who wish their child to carry and self-administer prescribed medication for diagnosed conditions, e.g. asthma inhaler, should make a request for them to do so in writing on the 'Request to Carry and Self Administer Medication' 'Form Med 3 (available from the school office).
- The school will complete and store all documentation in accordance with the ten standards required in the North Yorkshire County Council Document, October 2008, 'Managing the Health Care Needs of Children and Young People.

## Growing independence

## Taking care of themselves

- Putting on/taking off their coat and shoes
- Using the toilet and washing their hands
- Getting dressed with little help, e.g. after using the toilet or doing PE
- Using cutlery (e.g. fork and spoon, chopsticks) and drinking from an open cup
- Spending time away from you, learning they can be looked after by caring adults

- Taking part in imaginative play (e.g. role play)
- Drawing, painting, colouring and sticking
- Sharing story books with caregivers, looking at pictures and talking about the characters
- Exploring the world around them (e.g. looking closely at the natural world or playing safely with objects at home)

## **Building relationships and communicating**

## Being with others

- Practising sharing and taking turns with toys
- Talking to them about how they are feeling and why
- Looking at story books together and speaking about what characters are feeling is a good way to do this
- · Beginning to recognise what others are feeling, e.g. understanding if a friend is sad
- Encouraging them to set boundaries for themselves and others (e.g. knowing how to say 'no')

## Communication and language

- · Singing along with songs and nursery rhymes
- · Talking happily to others about activities, experiences and the world around them
- Showing they need help by speaking clearly (in basic English or sign language)
- · Recognising the pattern of their name (so they can find it on their coat peg or jacket)

## Listening and engaging

- · Paying attention for short periods of time
- · Listening to and following simple instructions
- · Carrying on with a task even when it's difficult and bouncing back if things go wrong

## Physical development

## Getting moving for at least three hours a day

- Walking up and down steps (one foot at a time, using the wall for support)
- · Climbing, running, jumping and playing
- Catching a large ball (most of the time)
- · Doing simple puzzles and craft activities, strengthening their grip with cutting and sticking

## **Healthy routines**

- · Going to bed around the same time each night, waking up in time to get ready for school
- · Limiting screen time to the recommended daily amounts (see advice)
- · Eating a healthy diet and trying new foods
- Brushing their teeth with fluoride toothpaste twice a day (you'll need to supervise this until they are at least 7)

## What should I do if I have concerns about my child's development?

- If you're worried about your child's progress, talk to your childminder/nursery/pre-school team, health visitor, local children's centre or Family Hub.
- If your child has developmental delays or SEND (suspected or confirmed), speak to their nursery, childminder, or health visitor/nursery/pre-school team well before they start Reception and discuss their needs when you are selecting schools.
- · You can work with your child's early years setting to help your child with selfcare, managing emotions, social skills and communication in a way that suits their stage of development.
- You might want to share details about: their development, needs, what motivates them, what might trigger difficulties, how they learn best, and what strategies work well.
- · Make sure you share important information with everyone supporting your child, including their new Reception teacher.

## Drinks in school

## Milk

Pupils across the whole school get the option to have milk daily. Registration forms, costs and more details are available from the school office.

Milk is free up to the day a child turns 5 or if in receipt of free school meals.

## Drinking Water in School

- You can help us by:
   Cleaning and filling water bottle daily
   Only using water in the bottles no juice/fizzy drinks please.

From time to time, we encounter children regularly being provided with juice in their water bottle. We stress that water is best. Please support us with this.

Each new child is provided with a Northstead water bottle. Replacemen't bottles can be purchased from the school office.

As part of the policy adopted by Northstead School to be a healthy school, we encourage all children to drink water throughout the school day. It is known that drinking water increases concentration and helps with the ability to think and learn. It is also good for our health, reducing headaches and helping prevent problems that are caused by dehydration such as kidney and urinary tract problems.



## Fruit and Vegetables

Northstead is pleased to be part of the 'School Fruit and Vegetable Scheme'. This scheme provides a piece of fresh fruit or vegetable to each child in Early Years Foundation Stage and Key Stage I (infants) every day, free of charge.

Key Stage 2 pupils (juniors) are encouraged to bring a piece of fruit from home to eat during morning break.

Any other breaktime snacks must be low in sugar and fat.

The '5 a day' campaign, encouraging us all to eat five portions of fruit or vegetables each day, is supported by our school and the school canteen. Parents can also support their children by providing healthy options in lunch boxes. As a school, the promotion of healthy eating and exercise is very much part of our curriculum.





## School Dinners

Children are encouraged to have a school lunch and have a choice of meals including:

- Hot meal.
- Vegetarian option
- Jacket potato with a range of fillings and salad
- Sandwich choice

The menus are planned and cooked to provide a healthy and balanced meal (in line with the school food standards) at lunchtime. If your child chooses to bring a packed lunch then we encourage parents to include healthy choices for your child's packed lunch. Please do not send glass bottles or canned drinks.

Do not include any nut-based products in a packed lunch. We are a nut-free school to prevent any allergic reactions which can be life-threatening. (This also includes 'Nutella.)

All infant school children (Early Years, Year I and Year 2) are eligible for a free school meal through the current government initiative.

## On the school grounds, we expect all parents and carers to...

- Adhere to the no smoking and vaping policy
- Not use any inappropriate language
- Act in accordance with the expectations we place on our staff and the children e.g. we speak to each other courteously and without a raised voice
- · Put their own rubbish in the bins provided
- · Ensure when picking up their children, they ensure the safety of them by not allowing them to climb on equipment, fences etc
- Sit on the chairs or benches provided (not on the tables)
- Not bring any pets onto the school premises, especially dogs. (It doesn't matter how big or small they are or whether you are carrying them or they are in a bag).
- Greet your child with a smile not a mobile.
- Dress appropriately for a playground.





## Travel to and from School

We encourage parents and children to walk or cycle to school if at all possible. This is to promote a healthy lifestyle and also in the interests of safety for the children when they arrive and leave school.

The road outside school becomes very congested and difficult to cross at the beginning and end of the school day, and safety is further compromised by parents dropping off or picking up children in front of the school entrances.

If your journey to school is too far to walk all the way, we would like to encourage you to consider leaving your car five minutes away from school and travelling the remaining distance on foot.

Children who cycle or scooter to school may leave their bicycle or scooter in the bike shelter but must not ride their bike or scooter on the school grounds. Failure to follow this expectation will result in the child not being allowed to bring their bike or scooter onto the school grounds.



Be a responsible member of our community and keep our children and families safe on Maple Drive

Do not park in front of our resident's driveways.

Do not park on the zig zags or double yellow lines outside of school.



## If you need to talk to us...

All teachers and staff are available for informal or brief discussions on matters concerning your child at the end of the school day. (After 3:10pm).

On a morning (from 8:30am) all teachers are in class working with children as they arrive into school and are therefore unavailable for parental discussion.

On a morning, senior members of staff and members of our pastoral team are on the school gates and playgrounds should you need to speak to one of them about your child.

Please call the school office at any point on 01723 362249 to request a call back from your child's class teacher at a convenient time.

Because of the nature of working in school, staff will normally be able to call back at the end of the school day.

If an appointment with the headteacher or other senior leader is needed, a phone call to the office to arrange this should be made.

## Open evenings / Parents' evenings

There are three opportunities for you to formally meet your child's class teacher.

The first Open evening is in the Autumn term, usually October/November, at which parents have the opportunity to discuss with the class teacher how their child is settling into class, and/or any problems that may have arisen and how the parent can support the child's learning.

In the Spring term there is a second opportunity to formally meet the class teacher to look at your child's work and identify targets for him/her to work on to help in bringing about improvement.

In the Summer term, usually in early July, the class teacher will produce a full written report on the child's progress. This report is retained by the parents.

Throughout the year, we also hold a variety of sessions in school for which parents and carers are invited to attend. These include but are not limited to: stay and learn, book and bagel, spelling bee, poetry festival, tea and toast, sports days, school plays and performances and our school sports days.




